ow dismal the warehouses along the banks of the Thames must have been in Victorian times. They were probably damp, dingy, dark and satanic, like the mills described by the poet, Blake, which were immortalised in Parry's hymn.

Harvest at the Tangerine Cafe, Chelsea Physic Garden, Chelsea



The Tangerine Café is as close to 'godliness' in terms of its surroundings as it is to its cuisine. The Cafe can be found in the heart of Chelsea's Physic Garden, at 66 Royal Hospital Road, SW3.

Much has been written about this food haven surrounded by healing and nurturing plants and herbs. Run by caterers Limpet Barron and David Hughes the Café offers a nutritional and exquisite selection of dishes to feed both eye and mouth and to suit even the fussiest of diners' tastes.

The menus change daily to reflect seasonal produce changes as well as the markets' best value and quality offerings. Here you will find some of the most creative salads and innovative cakes in the Royal Borough.

Regular dishes include: savoury tart made of goat cheese, gruyere and sun dried tomato, all sharing the thinnest and crispiest of pastry. Salmon is served en-croute with stem ginger and currents. The abundantly coloured mixed salad platters would sit just as happily as works of Art in the Tate Modern. Ingredients include: peas, endamame beans, green and yellow courgettes with chopped mint or Umbrian lentils with squash, gold and purple beets dressed in red wine vinegar, olive oil, balsamic grain mustard vinaigrette and a refreshing salad of water melon with feta cheese, black olives and flat leaf parsley.

Hot dishes include: Veal saltimbocca with sage and mustard mash, Aberdeen Angus rib-eye steak with gigantic Portobello mushrooms, horseradish cream and tiny fried potatoes. Then there are the irresistible scallops and monkfish, skewered and adorned with puy lentils, mango, pineapple, chilli and mint salsa, causing a riot of taste and texture sensations. Cod with chick peas and chorizo is top-hatted with aioli.

The puddings are no less glamorous. If pastry chef Limpet Barron and her fresh baking skills could be cloned obesity would reign in the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea. She offers no mercy with her ingredients, catering to even the most dessert shy customers' taste. We ate our way through all of these: fig and almond tart with fresh thyme and honey, Tunisian citrus almond cake, orange and polenta cake, lemon tart made with Amalfi lemons, Sacher torte decorated with crystallised violets, Jamaican ginger cake, zucchini and walnut cake and a lemon sponge so tasteful that it could ruin diners' appetites for any other dessert menus.

Opening times for the Garden and Cafe are from 1st April to 31st October. The Café opens at noon, hot lunch is served from 12.30 – 3.30 and teas are served until 4.45. on Wednesday, Thursday and Fridays, and until 5.45 on Sundays and Bank Holidays.



The Chelsea Physic Garden The Garden's Patron: HRH The Prince of Wales KG KT GCB OM

The Physic Garden was founded in 1673 by the Society of Apothecaries of London in order that their apprentices could grow, learn and study the uses of medicinal plants. In 1712 Hans Sloane bought the Manor of Chelsea from Charles Cheyne and took over the freehold of the garden. Sloane was knighted in 1716 and became President of the Royal Society and the Royal College of Physicians. He was sympathetic to the Apothecaries granting them a lease on the land for a rent of £5 a year in perpetuity on condition it be forever kept up and maintained as a Physic Garden. When Sloane died, aged almost 93, his collection of curiosities and his vast library became the nucleus of the British Museum, later moving to the Natural History Museum. Sloane's name lives on in local streets such as Hans Crescent and Sloane Square, and the rent of £5 per annum is still paid to his heirs. Entrance Eee to the Garden is f8 Annual

Afghanistan Hero honoured on 'The Soldiers' second album

'The Soldiers', Lance Corporal Ryan Idzi, Staff Sergeant Richie Maddocks and Sergeant Major Gary Chilton, sang at Pryors Bank Café, Fulham, South-West London, on October 1st in support of ex-service personnel.

Pryors Bank Café was opened in July 2008 by the Sir Oswald Stoll Foundation, with the aim of getting former homeless ex-servicemen and women back into a working environment. The café is located in Bishop's Park by Putney Bridge. All profits go back to the Foundation which provides housing and support for vulnerable and disabled ex-service personnel, particularly those who have been homeless. 'The Soldiers' have donated £8,000 towards new equipment for the Café on behalf of their production company CPW.

'The Soldiers' performed two songs — 'Coming Home' from their debut double platinum album and 'Letters Home' — the first single to be taken from their new album 'Letters Home', released on 25 October. The



lyrics to 'Letters Home' were written by Guardsman Tony (Neil) Downes who died on active service in Afghanistan aged 20. Many serving soldiers compose a 'last letter' to their loved ones which are only opened in the event of their death. The lyrics were put to music composed by Nick Patrick and Jeff Chegwin.

Call for permanent memorial to remember the sacrifice made by 21 soldiers in the Battle of Saragarhi

n 12th September 1897, 21 soldiers from the 36th Sikh Regiment of British India defended their army post against 10,000 tribesmen in the Battle of Saragarhi, fought during the Tirah Campaign, in the North-West Frontier Province, now part of Pakistan.

The 21 brave Sikhs from the 36th Sikh regiment fought to the death and in doing so delayed the tribesmen long enough for reinforcements to arrive and defend nearby forts.

The call for a permanent memorial to remember the sacrifice the Sikhs made was held in the National Army Museum, Royal Hospital Road, Chelsea, September 10th to mark Saragarhi Day (Sunday September 12th) and was supported by prominent members of the Sikh community and the former head of the British Army.

His Honour Judge Sir Mota Singh QC, the UK's first Sikh and Asian judge said: "The bravery shown by these soldiers is unbelievable and it is important that their sacrifice is remembered. The creation of a memorial to these 21 soldiers will act as a permanent reminder to us all of this famous battle. We are asking the government to formally recognise the sacrifice made by these 21 Sikhs soldiers." Judge Mota Singh was knighted in the Queen's New Year Honours List for "services to the Administration of Justice, Community Relations and to the Voluntary Sector"

Field Marshal Sir John Chapple, former chief of the general staff, commented: "Sikh regiments have played a hugely important role in the British Indian Army and the soldiers who laid down their lives at the Battle of Saragarhi were immensely brave. The Battle of Saragarhi is not well known but is an extremely important part of history and should be remembered and thanks paid to the soldiers and their families."

Broadcaster, Dr Indarjit Singh CBE, who is also backing the campaign, added: "Such



episodes in history are important in that they both inspire and help us reflect on how such courage can help us face the future. Recalling the historic episode of Saragarhi inspires us to do just this."

Pops from Glaswegian bhangra group Tigerstyle also added: "A lot of young Sikhs are unaware of role that Sikh soldiers have played in the British Army, and particularly at the Battle of Saragarhi. This monument will not only allow us to remember these 21 Sikh soldiers but all Sikhs who have fought alongside the British Army."

A campaign, coordinated by the Anglo Sikh Heritage Trail, is launching a competition for the art world to win the commission for the memorial. The campaign is also asking the government to officially recognise the battle and its crucial role in British history.

The 21 Sikh soldiers who sacrificed their lives were posthumously awarded the Indian Order of Merit, the highest gallantry award of the time that an Indian soldier could receive.

Saragarhi Day is marked by a series of events across the UK to recognise the enormously

important role in the British Army that Sikh soldiers have made in the past and continue to make today. These will include presentations to descendants of soldiers who fought in the Tirah Campaign, in the North-West Frontier Province.

When the gallantry of Saragarhi was recounted it led Queen Victoria to comment: "The British, as well as the Indians, are proud of the 36th Sikh Regiment. It is no exaggeration to record that the armies which possess the valiant Sikhs cannot face defeat in war."

The campaign is also urging people to pledge their support by logging onto Facebook and searching 'Saragarhi Tradition Never Dies'.

The Battle of Saragarhi

The 36th Sikh Regiment of the British Army was created on 20th April 1894, with five companies sent to the North West Frontier in 1897 and stationed at Samana Hills, Kurag, Sangar, Sahtop Dhar and Saragarhi.

The North West Frontier Province was a volatile area where the British had gained partial

control. A series of forts were constructed with two of the forts at Fort Lockhart, (on the Samana Range of the Hindu Kush mountains), and Fort Gulistan (Sulaiman Range). Positioned a few miles apart they were not visible to each other, therefore Saragarhi was created midway, as a heliographic communication post.

In 1897 an uprising by the tribesmen began and they made several efforts to capture the forts. On September 12, 1897, 10,000 tribesmen attacked the signalling post at Saragarhi, so that communication would be lost between the two forts.

Led by Havildar Ishar Singh, and with no reinforcements on hand, the soldiers decided to fight to the last to prevent the enemy reaching the forts.

Bhagwan Singh was the first casualty and despite being seriously wounded, Lal Singh and Jiwa Singh carried the dead body of Bhagwan Singh back to the inner layer of the post. In an act of outstanding bravery Ishar Singh ordered his men to fall back into the inner layer, whilst remaining to fight. However, all but one of the defending soldiers were killed, along with many of the tribesmen.

Gurmukh Singh, who had communicated the entire battle to Col. Haughton, positioned at Fort Lockhart, was the last Sikh soldier standing. He is stated to have killed 20 Afghans, with the tribesmen having to set fire to the post to kill him. As he was dying he was said to have yelled repeatedly the regimental battle-cry "Jo Bole So Nihal, Sat Sri Akal, which means "He who cries God is Truth, is ever victorious."

Having destroyed Saragarhi, the tribesmen turned their attention to Fort Gulistan, but they had been delayed too long and reinforcements arrived.

The tribesmen stated that they had lost 180 people in the battle, however some 600 bodies are said to have been seen around the ruined post when the relief party arrived.



Kensington and Chelsea students given chance to use Olympic venue before the Games



S chool children from Kensington and Chelsea are being given a unique opportunity to try out adrenalinpumping white water rafting for free at the Lee Valley White Water Centre – the only brand new London 2012 venue to open to the public before the Games.

The venue will host the four day canoe slalom event during the Olympic Games and is being constructed by the Olympic Delivery Authority, opening to the public next spring.

Newly launched the Lee Valley Regional Park Authority's Education Pledge gives one school group in Kensington and Chelsea the opportunity to ride the rapids for FREE a year before the Olympians.

The selected school children will be among the first to experience the thrill of white water before the Olympians arrive. They will join school groups from all London boroughs and Essex and Hertfordshire.

School children from across the region visited the site to meet world championship medallist and member of Great Britain Canoe Slalom team, Lizzie Neave and Captain of the Men's Senior Great Britain Raft team, Paskell Blackwell.

Paskell said: "I'm delighted to be supporting the Education Pledge. Not only will it let the students of Kensington and Chelsea experience a completely new and exciting sport, they'll be trying out a brand new, state of the art, custom-built facility that cannot be matched anywhere in the world. To be able to watch the Olympians on the TV having tried the course out first is quite something."

Lizzie said: "This is a fantastic opportunity for the nation's children to be involved in the build up to the Games and to inspire the next generation of Olympic hopefuls. Team GB is looking forward to training at this unique centre and we are all very excited about what we can achieve here on home soil during the Games."

Michael Rye, Vice Chairman of Lee Valley Regional Park Authority, said: "We are thrilled to be able to offer school children in Kensington and Chelsea the opportunity to experience a free white water rafting session at Lee Valley White Water Centre.

"Young people are at the heart of the Olympic legacy and will feature heavily in the programmes and activities we'll run across the four venues the Authority will own and manage following the Games. I'm delighted to invite schools from across London, Essex and Hertfordshire to sign up for the Education Pledge - a unique opportunity to experience an early legacy for the Games."

Hugh Robertson, Minister for Sport and the Olympics, said: "This is a great opportunity for local children not only to experience a new sport, but also to get a flavour of the competition that will be happening on their doorsteps in 2012. Even better, those inspired by this opportunity will be able to use these state-of-the-art facilities after the Games, creating a real legacy for canoeing and rafting in the UK from the Olympics."

Kensington and Chelsea's Education Authority will be working with schools in the borough to select the lucky students who must be aged over 14.

The rafting sessions will take place as part of an Education Festival at the Lee Valley White Water Centre in June and July 2011. In addition to white-knuckle rafting the festival will see students learn about the venue and the Olympic and Paralympics' Games plus enjoy a range of activities such as orienteering in the stunning 1,000 acre River Lee Country Park surrounding the venue.

Lee Valley White Water Centre opens in spring 2011 and has two separate courses a 300m Olympic Games competition course and a 160m training course, perfect for sports development. Lee Valley Regional Park Authority is working hard to ensure the centre will be an inclusive facility, used by a huge mix of people, from schools and community groups to medal-winning athletes and future hopefuls.

The centre is one of four London 2012 venues Lee Valley Regional Park Authority will run after the Games, including the Lee Valley VeloPark and Lee Valley Hockey and Tennis Centres. 

BAXTERBEAR ON PARADE: 'SMALL BEAR WITH BIG STORY' ENLISTS AS MILITARY SHOW MASCOT

A furry phenomenon making lots of friends among military, medics and movie-makers alike is to take a leading role in one of London's most dramatic productions this year.

Baxterbear has been named mascot for the British Military Tournament, which is being held in early December.

The show, featuring cavalry charges, marching bands and even a reenactment of recent combat events in Afghanistan involving British forces, is being staged in aid of ABF The Soldiers' Charity.

It caps a remarkable year for Baxterbear, who has been seen on the battlefield and become the focus of attention by film studios wanting to bring his story to the big screen.

The account of how he survived a harrowing adventure during World War II captured the studios' imagination after they learned it had become an inspiration to current-day soldiers.

A reconnaissance plane piloted by his owner was shot down over the Burmese jungle and they were both left suspended by parachute from trees for five days before being rescued by Gurkhas. Together, they managed to escape to India, where both pilot and bear spent many months recovering from respective injuries.

Since Baxterbear's story came to light 18 months ago. psychologists around the world have credited it with helping children overcome behavioural difficulties.

Baxterbear has also become a significant fundraiser, helping generate more than £20,000 for various charities. Small Baxterbears were carried by members of the Coldstream Guards during a 425-mile hike from the Scottish borders to London in January.

A seven-foot tall version of Baxterbear also headed out to the Helmand province of Afghanistan in September as mascot of the Royal Highland Fusiliers, 2nd Battalion Royal Scottish Regiment. After regularly seeing Baxterbear on the kitbags of Coalition forces on operations throughout Afghanistan, military top brass saw his potential for providing a link between the soldiers and their families at home.

Baxterbear's PA. Daisy Tate, said his selection as mascot for the British Military Tournament was an honour. "We are delighted to be playing our part in what is sure to be not only incredible



entertainment but a wonderful means of supporting our armed forces.

"It has been an amazing year during which the appeal of Baxterbear has spread by word of mouth around the globe. It's humbling to imagine how soldiers, doctors and others believe his story provides both comfort and inspiration to those facing difficult circumstances - whatever and wherever they may be."

In addition to the British Military Tournament, which takes place on 4th and 5th December. Baxterbear will be mascot for the Haileybury Military Tournament on July 3rd next year, which is also being held in aid of ABF The Soldiers' Charity.
